

Inspiration Everywhere

Artists have been taking inspiration from the Welsh landscapes for hundreds of years to create beautiful art. Can you make a landscape at home out of scrap paper?

Why not use old magazines and newspaper to add extra texture and detail?

Why not make a portrait of your family, or try dressing up like one of your favourite museum objects or painting.





What about making a family crest like this one from the wall of Llys Llywelyn, a recreation of a Royal Court of the Princes of Gwynedd at St Fagans National Museum of History?

Decide on a shape. This could be a dragon or a house or something personal to your family. Fill the shape with all the things that are important to you as a family.


Use What You Have

These activities can all be done using things you'll find at home. Remember to clean things before you use them, and always wash your hands!

Use a piece of paper to make a boat. Newspaper pages are great. Decorate it to personalise it.

Old magazines, flyers or newspapers make great pots for seedlings. Try planting cress seeds in your pot. Try placing your pots in different places, and watch how fast they grow.





Make a sculpture from rubbish! Don't forget to take them apart when you are done so that they can be recycled.



Make Your Mark

Try these experiments to make your mark in different ways. Chalks are great for drawing outside, why not experiment on walls or pavements. Try recreating ancient cave art and draw our woolly mammoth from National Museum Cardiff.

Upside down – stick a piece of paper underneath a table and try drawing whilst lying on your back.

Did you know: Charcoal isn't actually made of coal, it's produced by burning wood

On your marks game – take a big piece of paper and fold it up to make 8 boxes. One person reads the challenges, the other draws! Move onto a new box for each new challenge and follow the instructions for 30 seconds.

- 1. Fill a box with squares
- 2. Press as hard as you can and scribble to fill a box
- 3. Press as lightly as you can and scribble to fill a box
- 4. Fill a box with circles
- 5. Fill a box with zig zags
- 6. Fill a box with waves
- 7. Fill a box with dots
- 8. Fill a box without looking at the page









What's Your Story?

Museums tell stories about people and places and things. A 'Zine' is a great way to create a story. Use this template to make a zine.

You can make a zine about anything. Why not make one about your favourite museum, music, film, sports team or animal?

Did you know we have a printing press at The National Waterfront Museum in Swansea?

Play a story telling game. This works best played with other people. Gather up some objects from your house and put them in a bag, pick them out one at a time and tell a story using the objects.

Write a shape poem. Have a go at creating a poem that describes your favourite museum object and write it in the shape of the object.

How to make:

- Fold your paper like this then cut through the **thick** black line.
- 2. Fold along the dotted line like this.
- 3. Then do the same on the other side.
- Open out your paper, then fold it along its length.
- 5. Push the two ends together like this.
- 6. Then fold into a booklet making sure the cover is at the front.
















Be A Nature Detective

Nature is all around if you look closely.

Collect things you find on your daily walk and bring them home to make them into a collage.



We've made ours in the shape of a tree, but you can use your imagination to make anything! Draw what you find. Scientists at the museum illustrate new species so that people can identify



them. Why not go on a minibeast drawing hunt?

Can you be an Industrial Detective too? While you're out and about exploring, look out for evidence of Wales' industrial past.



Why not try a game of nature bingo when you're out and about.

Patchwork blanket from National Wool Museum





Some Romans decorated the floors of their homes with mosaics. Make your own paper collage by cutting different kinds of paper into little squares and gluing them onto paper to make a pattern.





Section of mosaic from National Roman Legion Museum




